Course Description:

If you love to read but never seem to have enough time for it, this may be the perfect class for you. In this course students choose their own fiction books (age/skill appropriate), one each quarter. To receive credit for the course, students will read, analyze, and interpret literature, ultimately producing formal, argumentative essays. The class will be conducted in an independent workshop format. Feedback on writings will be done on a one to one basis. Students enrolling in this course must be able to focus on reading silently for entire class periods, manage their time well in order to complete reading and writing assignments by due dates, and use feedback to revise their work to meet rubric criteria.
